From Local to Cosmopolitan: Art Nouveau in Subotica – Szabadka

Subotica - Szabadka, a town settled on the north of Serbia, which was part of Austro-Hungarian Monarchy up to the First World War, experienced great development at the end of the 19th century. The success were crowned by great blossoming of Art Nouveau architecture inspired by Vienna and Darmstadt Secession, Munich Jugendstil, Hungarian secession and Belgian Art Nouveau. Although local Art Nouveau style was not developed and the most characteristic Art Nouveau buildings were made in the Hungarian secession style, local tradition, well incorporated into those buildings are presenting the local on cosmopolitan level. Turn of the century architects, educated in Vienna, Graz, Zürich, Munich and Budapest, who introduced different Art Nouveau styles in Subotica, brought cosmopolitism to the town that had been very much provincial in the past. Some of the buildings like the town hall, synagogue and Raichl palace are prominent examples of European heritage, and the town itself, with over 100 Art Nouveau buildings still has typical 19th century cityscape.
